

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR REPORT AUGUST 2017

Our national context

To our members who live in the Houston area, we stand with you in prayer and solidarity at this difficult time. May God protect you and hold you in the palm of his hand.

In the wake of the Charlottesville violence, Father Mark Francis, C.S.V. put into words what is within many of our hearts, so I share his message with you. [Francis is president of Catholic Theological Union in Chicago, on whose campus NRVC has its offices.]

We cannot look at the violence in Charlottesville without a sense of grief and sadness--not just about the injuries people have suffered and the loss of life--but also about what is happening in the United States. And, not only Charlottesville has offered us discouraging evidence of how much our national commitment to sharing our country and its values with one another is in jeopardy during these times. The increasing violence we have seen against our sisters and brothers of the Jewish and Muslim communities, the gun violence that plagues our [Chicago] streets and a growing unwillingness to welcome immigrants who come to live in our country testify to the danger we face as we attempt to build a society that advances the common good.

Catholic Theological Union joins the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (U.S.C.C.B), religious leaders everywhere, [the NRVC], and all Americans who deplore what has happened in Charlottesville and what is happening in the United States. In the light of our faith that emphasizes that all human beings are made in God's likeness and our common commitment to equality enshrined in the Declaration of Independence, we will continue to advance dialogue among peoples.... We remember the words of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.—*“Reform will not happen, nor the cure for racism and other oppressive injustices be found, unless we make the reform happen, unless we find the cure.”* Our work together goes on.

Connecting with national organizations

I was invited to and attended the following conferences and want to share a few highlights:

Convocation of Catholic Leaders: The Joy of the Gospel in America, held in Orlando, Florida from July 1-4. During this gathering of Catholic leaders, which was organized by the U.S.C.C.B., I attended breakout sessions on vocation and formation issues. It was an amazing gathering, with over 3,000 participants. I was able to network with new leaders of national organizations and reconnect with former colleagues. Additional highlights included:

- Hearing wonderful presenters, including Cardinal Donald Wuerl of the Archdiocese of Washington, D.C., who received a standing ovation as he spoke enthusiastically about the call to evangelization and about issues related to immigration [Cardinal Wuerl was the Vatican's relator general of the 2012 World Synod of Bishops on the New Evangelization and has published and spoken extensively on the subject.]

Conference of Major Superiors of Men, held in Phoenix August 1-4. It was an honor to be invited, included, and introduced. Some highlights were:
